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Carleton Place

General Information

Carleton Place was built in 2000. The facility is connected to the Central Carleton Nursing Home by means of an indoor walkway. The objective of Carleton Place is to provide supportive housing for semi dependant individuals who require services such as meals, laundry, housekeeping etc. Carleton Place does have a limited number of apartment type units for residents who are more independent. Residents in these units generally prepare their own meals, and they are responsible for their own housekeeping and laundry services. Carleton Place is a non-smoking facility.

Accommodations at Carleton Place

There are currently (12) small bed-sitting rooms, (2) double bed-sitting rooms and (3) large bed-sitting rooms at Carleton Place. In addition there are (2) 2-bedroom apartments and (2) 1-bedroom apartments. There is also (1) guest room available for rent by the day, week or month. All rooms have a private bathroom. Bedding is provided or tenants are welcome to bring their own and dressers and beds are available in some rooms. All residents of Carleton Place will be required to sign a lease. Please note the guidelines of allowable & non-allowable furniture which has been developed for safety reasons.

*Note: the apartments do not include utilities, meals, housekeeping and laundry services. Cable television service is included.

Shared facilities

There is a large dining room where tenants eat their meals. Meals are prepared by the Central Carleton Nursing Home Dietary Department and served by Carleton Place Staff, under the direction of a Registered Dietitian. Guests are able to purchase their meals while visiting family members at a reasonable cost. Parking facilities are available at the rear of Carleton Place and plug-ins are available for the winter months at a reasonable rate. A lounge area is also available for the use of tenants and their families. Weekly entertainment is organized by tenants in the lounge. As well tenants are welcome to attend activities taking place in the annexed Central Carleton Nursing Home. Activity Calendars are posted on a monthly basis.

Application for Residency

An application for residency is required for perspective tenants. The application must include the names of two references and the person(s) to contact in case of an emergency. In order to assist with assessing the suitability of applicants for residency at Carleton Place, the entire application must be submitted including **General Information** and the **Dietary Profile**.

Vial of Life Medical Profile

The **Vial of Life** is a program that allows individuals to have their complete medical information ready in their home for emergency personnel to reference during an emergency. Resident Review

If, in the opinion of staff and management, a resident's situation changes so that they require more support than what is available at Carleton Place, family members or the person listed as the main contact, will be consulted in order to address the situation. In situations like this, it is important that a plan be agreed to that takes into consideration what is best for the resident and is consistent with the goals of Carleton Place.
